Another authority, however, states that the Egyptian year commenced with the cosmic rising of Sirius, about the middle of July. The following extract is from Folk Lore, vol. xxv, No. 3: Ancient Celts and Teutons reckoned only two seasons in the year, and began it with the winter season in November, not with the summer season in May.
